FIFTH ANNUAL ART & NATURE FOCUSES ON CHILDREN THIS YEAR WITH ART, POETRY, AND NATURE ACTIVITIES

NICE, CA — The fifth-annual Art & Nature festival, a celebration of the arts that relate to nature, will be held Saturday, May 5, 2007, from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at Rodman Slough Preserve.

The Rodman House, the site of the new nature center at Rodman Slough Preserve, will be close to completion and open for viewing during the event. Guided walks of the property will be led by members of the Lake County Land Trust.
