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RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES ARE ABUNDANT IN KELSEYVILLE, CA, HOME OF THE PEAR FESTIVAL

KELSEYVILLE, CA — KELSEYVILLE, CA - Held the last Saturday of September each year, the 16th annual Kelseyville Pear Festival will be held September 27, 2008, from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on Main Street in historic downtown Kelseyville in Northern California.

The centerpoint of the Kelseyville Pear Festival is the Pear Pavilion - a large showcase of “everything pear” including historical photos, videos, and storytelling, agricultural exhibits, and cooking demonstrations, as well as some of Lake County’s finest “pear products” - from jams and jellies to refreshing pear ice cream and delicious pear pies, which always prove to be an early sell-out. Pear taste tests and pear-packing competitions are all part of the family fun.

The event celebrates the local pear harvest - and more. It is a day of fun for the whole family with a quilt show, a fine arts show, local arts and crafts, as well as performances throughout the day from local musicians, dancers, and cloggers. Mule-drawn wagon rides transport event-goers along the streets, adding to the hometown feel. Displays and exhibits focus on the town’s agricultural heritage, featuring the many types of pears grown in and around Kelseyville, affectionately known as the “Pear Capital of the World.”

Kelseyville is home to more than luscious pears, however, and planning an extended vacation will allow time to enjoy the agricultural products of the area - pears, wine, and walnuts - and so much more.

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Visiting Kelseyville

Kelseyville is a charming country town located just off State Highway 29, that scenic route famous for its north-south crossing of the Napa Valley, Lake County's southern neighbor.

In Kelseyville, visitors can taste fine wines from local vines or sip a latte with the locals; dine in casual chic; luxuriate in a massage; browse shops of antiques, beads, fun gifts, and home décor; hike a forest, splash in a lake, or take a swing on a green; enjoy all sorts of events; and then relax at a classic lakeside resort or a cute cabin in the pines. What to Do

Boating...

While Kelseyville has a charming Main Street with dining and shops, it also encompasses vast areas along the south shore of Clear Lake, which is the largest natural freshwater lake in California. Clear Lake is one of the most ancient lakes on the North American continent — possibly the world — with lakes existing at the site of Clear Lake for approximately 2.5 million years. Pomo Indians, the region's earliest inhabitants, called the lake "Lypoyomi," which means "big water."

Fishing...

More than 100 miles of shoreline, an average depth of 28 feet, constant water renewal due to tectonic plate activity below the lake bottom, geothermal hot springs, and nutrient-rich waters all contribute to Clear Lake's well-known reputation for bass fishing. In fact, ESPN recently ranked Clear Lake as the #2 *bass fishing destination in the Western Hemisphere*. While Clear Lake is most notably known as the "Bass Capital of the West," other species include Sacramento perch, channel and white catfish, brown bullheads, white and black crappies, bluegill, and carp.

Clear Lake State Park

Take the Indian Nature Trail (moderate, less than .5 mile) for a fantastic hike with glorious views of the vineyard and orchard tapestry of Kelseyville's Big Valley and occasional glimpses of Clear Lake. Other hikes include the Lower Dorn Trail (moderate to steep, .5 mile) and the Upper Dorn Trail (moderate to steep, .75 mile), both of which offer spectacular lake vistas. Hike the whole loop for a two-mile

Boggs Mountain Demonstration State Forest

Just 25 minutes from downtown Kelseyville, this beautiful forest totals 3,493 acres of land at elevations between 2,400 and 3,750 feet. Features 25 miles of unimproved roads, 21 miles of nonmotorized use trails, and two no-fee campgrounds with 19 campsites. Great opportunity for hiking, mountain biking, or horseback riding amid ponderosa pine and Douglas fir, as well as areas of chaparral, manzanita, mixed conifer forest, coffeeberry, and live and black oak. Four creeks originate near the mountain top. Along with several bird species, the black-tailed hare, black bear, bobcat, gray fox, mountain lion, mule deer, raccoon, wild pig, garter snake, sagebrush lizard, southern alligator lizard, western fence lizard, and western rattlesnake are the major wildlife that call Boggs home. Pears...

Kelseyville has a long agricultural heritage and from the late 1800s through much of the 20th century, the town was known as the Pear Capital of the World and famous for its Lake County Mountain Bartletts, which are still a primary crop, as well as several other varieties of pears, including Bosc, Asian Pears, Starkrimson, Red Bartletts, Seckel, and more. Pears are harvested from July through October, with the bulk of harvest in the month of August.

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In season, visitors can arrange for a tour of a local pear-packing shed to see the beautiful fruit come in fresh from the orchards, get rinsed, sorted, and then hand-packed before moving into cold storage before being shipped to grocers and restaurants across the country and beyond.
